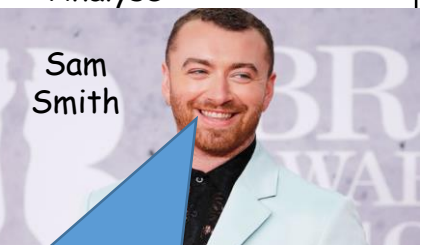

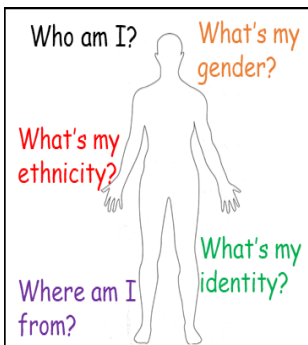

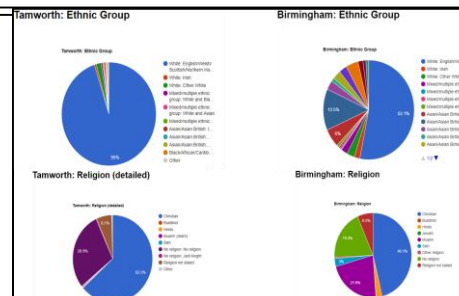
Immigration

- From 2010 to 2016, an estimated annual average of 495,000 non-British citizens moved to the UK with the intention of staying for 12 months or longer. An estimated annual average of 190,000 left the country to live abroad during the same period.
- Economic and labour market factors are a major driver of international migration and work is currently the main reason for migration to the UK.
- Language, study opportunities, and established networks are all factors that encourage people to migrate to the UK.
- The UK has relatively high numbers of migrants in comparison to other EU countries, but has neither the highest in absolute terms nor the biggest share of migrants in the population.
- Immigration policy is not the only policy that affects migration flows; others include policies on employment and trade, etc.

Movember

Campaigns like Movember have been raising awareness for Men's mental health since 2004. During the month of November, men all around the world grow a moustache to show support for men's health issues.

By encouraging men to get involved, Movember aims to increase early cancer detection, diagnosis and effective treatments, and ultimately reduce the number of preventable deaths. Since 2004 the Movember Foundation has run events to raise awareness and funds for men's health issues, such as prostate cancer and depression, starting in Australia and spreading globally since 2007.



#metoo movement

The me too movement is a movement against sexual harassment and sexual assault of women. The phrase 'metoo' was initially used in the context on social media in 2006 on Myspace by sexual harassment survivor Tarana Burke. It is now used to empower women through empathy and solidarity through strength in numbers, especially in vulnerable women by showing how many women have survived harassment, especially in the workplace.

How multi-cultural is Britain?

Although many areas of the UK are diverse with many cultures mixing together, there are still lots of places that are not.

Here are some reasons for this:

- Some cultures are drawn to their own cultures e.g. a Sikh would live in a Sikh area of a city.
- Some may be worried about racism/prejudice in non-diverse areas.
- There may be more job opportunities in larger areas.
- There is better transport within larger towns/cities.

Are women really treated equally in the modern day?

Education- Although 45% of academics were female, male graduates earn £24-27K compared to £21-24K for women who studied the same subject in similar Universities.

Sexual Health- Women in Scotland, England and Wales still need the approval of 2 doctors before an abortion can be performed.

Home and family- around 54,000 women lose their jobs due to pregnancy discrimination.

Violence against women- On average, two women a week are killed each year by a current or former partner, Reported incidents of domestic violence have increased by 31% since 2013.

Politics- 29% of MPs are women. The UK ranks 39th in the world for representation of women in parliament.

Work- The pay gap stood at 13.9% for full time work in 2016. A female apprentice earned on average £2,000 less than a male apprentice in 2016.

Religious views on gender

Christianity: Although Eve was portrayed as a temptress in the Bible, Christians are accepting of women in the Church as member and worker. The Catholic faith only allowed men to be ordained.

Hindus and Muslims: Used to view women as inferior and a man's property. However, there is now an agreement that women should have the right to an opinion and what to wear in public.

Sikhs: have always that women are worthy of praise and equal to men, this initially shocked other Eastern religions.
