
- Underage drinking

## The Wave (Gansel, 2008)

- Based on Ron Jones' USA experiment in the 1960s.
- · Set in contemporary Germany.
- Captures the 'zeitgeist' the boredom of spoilt, middle-class youths.
- Echoes of the rise of the Nazi Party in 1930s Germany. • Explores the dangers of political systems & autocracy.

### Potential themes:

- -fascism.
- -Identity (loss of/struggle with)
- -Coming of age
- -Teacher/pupil relationships
- -Radicalisation
- -Authority



- Struggling with a sense of identity
- Becoming distanced from their cultural or religious background
- Questioning their place in society
- Family issues

### Example questions

- 2. (a) Name and briefly describe one young character in your chosen film. [2]Who is it? Who are they?
- (b) Briefly describe the costume of this character on their first appearance.
- [3]What do they wear? (Colour? Type of clothes?) What could each represent or say about the character?
- (c) Briefly explore how other aspects of mise-en-scène (setting, location and props) are used to create your first impression of this young character in one sequence from the beginning of your chosen film. [5] What is your first impression of the character? What is the sequence? Why is this important about the character? What M-E-S are used in this scene to create the character (HOW USED? WHY USED?) Why is this significant?
- (d) Explore how young people are represented in your chosen film. Refer to at least one sequence where young people are shown. In your answer, you should consider:
- how at least two young people are represented in your chosen film
- 🛽 how two of the following contribute to the representation of young people in your film cinematography, mise-en-scène, editing or sound
- ② how at least one sequence demonstrates the representation of young people. [15]
